1 MR. AMODIO: Roll call. 2 3 (Roll call was taken, all Commissioners present respond in the affirmative. Commissioners Sanchez and Rodriguez are absent. Commissioner 5 6 Levine is not present yet) 7 MR. AMODIO: Commissioners Sanchez and 8 9 Rodriguez will not be here. 10 Commissioner Levine is not yet here. 11 You have a quorum. 12 The time is 9:49 a.m. 13 All of the requirements of the Open Public 14 Meetings Act have been met. Commission meeting 15 notice have been furnished to all Commissioners, 16 City Clerks of Paterson, Passaic, and Clifton; 17 North Jersey Herald News, the Passaic County 18 edition; and the Commission's Executive Staff with 19 a copy posted on the main bulletin board of the 20 Clifton facility. 21 Please rise. 22 Commissioner Kolodziej, would you please 23 lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance. 24 Commissioners, we have members of the 25 public that wish to address the Commission.

Mr. Duprey, would you please ask them to come in.

Thank you.

MR. HANLEY: Commissioners, I'd like to introduce Mr. and Mrs. Falcone. They are residents of Nutley. Portions of their backyard share space with our easement. They have a fence which goes across it which we are aware of.

Generally speaking, Jim, correct me if I'm misstating this, we do not see that that's something of a major moment to our operations.

MR. DUPREY: That's correct.

MR. HANLEY: There are also two different documents which relate to the history of this particular property. One is an easement that was granted by Passaic Valley Water Commission in 1985 that's granted the right for the fence. Okay.

In addition to that, there's a letter back in 2004 which both Jim Duprey and I were involved with at that time which granted them the right to place a shed on the property with our easement as well. Again, on the basis of the fact that we didn't see any harm to our operations so long as they understood, you know, if we ever needed to go in and do something with the easement, the shed

might have to be moved or removed or whatever. 1 2 So as I see it, that's the history in a 3 nutshell. It's also the ongoing saga of the Nutley easement issue. 5 They have requested certain modifications. 6 And by the way, this overlaps with our 7 obligation to maintain the easement which impacts 8 Mr. Marotta's operation as well. 9 So that's what they're here for is to seek your consent to make certain modifications to 10 11 those existing approvals which I didn't think 12 should be granted by staff alone. So that's why they've come this morning. 13 14 Jim, have I missed anything? 15 MR. DUPREY: No, George. 16 And I believe the changes that they had 17 requested was to merely replace the decking, not 18 make it larger or any change in its footprint, but 19 merely just to replace, you know, a deteriorating 20 wooden deck with a replacement material. 21 MR. HANLEY: Did you want to elaborate on 22 it? 23 MS. FALCONE: That's basically all I was requesting. I was a little concerned, the letter 24 2.5 I first received said that I was looking to

1	replace the fence. So I wanted to correct that
2	because that was our concern.
3	MR. HANLEY: Well, we appreciate that.
4	MS. FALCONE: So the decking, part of the
5	decking encroaches on the easement. I was looking
6	to replace that; repair it.
7	MR. HANLEY: My understanding is you're
8	not looking to expand the deck?
9	MS. FALCONE: No, not at all.
10	MR. HANLEY: Simply, the way you
11	MS. FALCONE: It's over 27 years old.
12	It's splintering. It needs to be replaced. Like
13	I said, a portion of my deck does encroach on the
14	property.
15	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: Was the deck part of
16	the approval?
17	MR. HANLEY: Yes.
18	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: It's understood if
19	something happens, we need access
20	MR. HANLEY: I believe you understood
21	that?
22	MS. FALCONE: Yes. That's the easement
23	agreement, right.
24	MR. HANLEY: The language in the easement
25	reflects that.

1 COMMISSIONER DeVITA: Includes the deck. 2 MR. HANLEY: What we may want to do and I assume you would be amenable to it, is update 3 these agreements. Put it all in one document or 5 two. 6 MS. FALCONE: That's fine. 7 MR. HANLEY: So what I'd like, with the 8 permission of the Commission and yourselves, have 9 an understanding that we'll revisit these documents. They're somewhat old. And try to make 10 11 one document. And I'm not sure whether it will be 12 an easement or license, but something that gives 13 you the right to do what you want to do but also 14 protects our rights. MS. FALCONE: I understand completely. 15 16 Okay. That's fine. 17 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: I'm along the same lines as Commissioner DeVita. Originally, 18 19 you said the easement was granted for a fence and 20 a shed. I'm reading something here that says two 21 sheds are now there; so. 22 MR. HANLEY: That was -- I believe --23 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: And you're going 24 to correct all of this by the time it comes back 25 to us. Because I'm telling you right now,

1 whatever was granted in the past, I'm willing to 2 support and certainly needs to be replaced. But any expansion on that whatsoever, this 3 Commissioner is -- we had property after property 5 in Nutley doing this and my concern is if anything 6 ever happens there and we have all these nice 7 things that these people have put there, are going 8 to disappear because we're going to have to 9 replace or whatever. So you will make it clear to this 10 11 Commission, what was granted in the past that this 12 is just a replacement for existing things that were granted. And that, you know, if it's going 13 14 to be a request for additional things, I'm just 15 letting you know how I'm going to vote. Anything 16 that exists that you have to replace, I'm okay 17 with. Anything new that's going to be put up or 18 whatever, I'm certainly going to be --19 MS. FALCONE: Of course. I understand 20 completely. 21 MR. FALCONE: We're going to follow the 22 proper channels. MS. FALCONE: And I feel we have. 23 24 MR. BELLA: We don't always have the

luxury of people like this that cooperate.

1	MS. FALCONE: I want to do things right.
2	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: Thank you.
3	MR. HANLEY: So we'll proceed in that
4	fashion. It's okay with you?
5	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: Replacement is fine
6	with me.
7	PRESIDENT VANNOY: George, I guess you'll
8	have that drawn up for the next meeting?
9	MR. HANLEY: I'm going to write it,
10	although, it's easy to explain the implementation
11	of it, it has a lot of details. I hope to have
12	it.
13	PRESIDENT VANNOY: Right. Okay.
14	MS. FALCONE: Thank you very much for your
15	time.
16	MR. AMODIO: For the record, it's 49 Chase
17	Street, Nutley, New Jersey.
18	PRESIDENT VANNOY: I'm assuming they can't
19	do anything.
20	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: That's right.
21	MR. AMODIO: Moving on.
22	I don't think there's any other members of
23	the public. We'll move onto committee reports.
24	I don't believe there was a personnel or
25	finance committee meeting this month.

1 PRESIDENT VANNOY: Right. 2 MR. AMODIO: I don't believe there was an IT or legal affairs committee meeting. Is that 3 correct, Commissioner Bazian? COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: That's correct. 5 6 MR. AMODIO: So there's no reports? 7 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: I do have an update that I just got from Jim yesterday with some 8 9 updates. On the telephone system, he says the cable 10 11 is completed in Clifton. 12 Little Falls started the day before 13 yesterday. 14 He says the project is on track and within 15 budget. 16 The BPR is running on track; that's the 17 Business Process Review is on track and within 18 budget. 19 We hit a problem with the the System; 20 that's the AS/400. Jim actually called me on this 21 in the middle of the month. There was something 22 that was causing the system to basically run at 23 almost 100 percent, 97 and a half is what he has 24 noted here. And that was unusual. And when a 2.5 computer runs at that capacity, things slow down

1 and errors start to occur and things like that. They looked into it. It seemed like a 2 process was started that went into a loop which 3 was my guess when I heard it. They corrected it. 5 He says here, "New equipment was installed at a 6 total cost of \$1300 to prevent this from happening in the future." But I don't know what that 7 8 equipment is so I can't speak to that. 9 He mentions here that new phones are going to be issued to all field employees. I believe 10 we're away from Blackberries --11 12 PRESIDENT VANNOY: You're talking about 13 new cell phones? 14 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Yes, new cell 15 phones. If memory serves, I had a discussion with Jim about this. If and when he comes in we can 16 17 ask him to clarify, but I believe we're moving 18 away from Blackberries? 19 MR. BELLA: Absolutely. They're too 20 expensive. 21 PRESIDENT VANNOY: What are we moving to? 22 MR. BELLA: Just, you know, a smartphone. 23 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Androids. I 24 remember now. We're moving to Androids. 25 The issue is in order to get certain

services with Blackberry, you pay extra and the
Android is free. According to Jim, that would

nice thing.

This is something new. I'm just going to mention this. I know nothing other than what he said here but I'm certainly going to look into this further. He said that we're participating with the State of New Jersey in developing some type of computer training course or program at little or no cost to the Commission. I'm interested as to what that is and what our role in that is. I'll try to look at that and come back with more information.

PRESIDENT VANNOY: Commissioner.

question. I just thought maybe I missed the e-mail that said that we had a meeting. We didn't. I'm going back to our July meeting and I asked Yitz and I'm sure every other Commissioner would be interested in seeing, you mentioned our Business Process Review that we're on track and on budget. We were told that in July. I have no idea what that means, what the timetable is, and I'm very interested in breaking down the cost that

we have put out to this firm to date so that I can assure myself that it is within our budget.

COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: I expect that there will be an IT committee meeting within the next couple of weeks.

COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: But this doesn't have to necessarily wait. I'm interested in this now and I think we have a standing policy that when one Commissioner asks for something, it automatically goes to everybody else so we can all keep up to date.

PRESIDENT VANNOY: Exactly.

COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: I think that's important. This is a very important process.

Also, at our July meeting, we had an internal committee that is meeting with our consultants and that's supposed to be the key as far as the information that they need. So can we find out who is on that internal committee, how often you guys are meeting, and how it's meshing with the consultants? And that can wait until the IT meeting. I think it's important here for the confidence level getting my money's worth. I can't wait for the bottom line.

COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: I couldn't agree

1	with you more, Commissioner. My apologies.
2	PRESIDENT VANNOY: Real quick, who is that
3	coming from?
4	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: No, no, the
5	internal committee would be Joe.
6	PRESIDENT VANNOY: I'm sorry, I'm going
7	back. Not the internal, how much we spent so far?
8	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: That would come
9	from Yitz and I don't want to wait until the next
10	committee meeting.
11	PRESIDENT VANNOY: How long will it take
12	you to get that information?
13	MR. WEISS: I can get that today.
14	PRESIDENT VANNOY: Via e-mail?
15	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: Yeah, I don't
16	really care. I'm also saying we're on a timetable
17	I just heard with the telephone. I don't know
18	what their timetable is. I keep thinking this
19	month it's going to be wrapped up
20	PRESIDENT VANNOY: The timetable is one
21	thing, but we need to know
22	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: Thank you. Thank
23	you. You got it.
24	COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Why don't we ask Jim
25	to come in so we can ask him some of these

1 questions directly.

COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: Does it really matter with a skeleton crew here? Do you really want to go into this? I think I can wait for Jim to give me an update. I just need the numbers. I just need the timetable and then when we have a full Commission, I think it will be more appropriate.

COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: I mean, just in terms of the Business Process Review, I agree with you. I think in the almost three years I've been here, I think it's one of the most significant things we've undertaken because it has the potential and it is my expectation that it can affect us from top to bottom for the good. So as much as you're looking for the bottom line, because I've been dying for this to start to happen, because I think this is really, I think it can really help us a lot.

MR. AMODIO: Any further questions?

Any further committee reports?

Hearing none, we'll move onto the

Executive Director's report.

MR. BELLA: The month of July was, we had a really big month in terms of actual usage. In

1 fact, every day was over a hundred million gallons 2 of water every day. Sort of slowed down all of these rainstorms. It's still in the 90s. 3 We're doing some work in the plant now. We have the plant scaled back a little. 5 6 PRESIDENT VANNOY: What's our usual? Around 75? 7 8 MR. BELLA: Eighty. 9 PRESIDENT VANNOY: Okay. All right. MR. BELLA: Wholesale sales have been up 10 11 substantially this year. We're getting into the 12 final phases of the Clifton Ave. rehabilitation, main break rehabilitation. We've been postponing 13 14 that because the mains have been so high. We're 15 concerned with the dirty water and those kind of 16 problems. 17 The next big phase is going to be on the 18 corner of Clifton and Van Houten right in front of 19 the municipal building and that's a spot we're 20 trying to fix for a lot of years. 21 The cleaning lining project is on track 22 going well. So we're making a lot of progress in 23 terms of the rehabilitation of the system. 24 That's pretty much it. 2.5 The finances --

COMMISSIONER DeVITA: I have a strange 1 2 question. Above Ground Storage Tanks were inspected, 3 Cathodic protection was identified as an 5 outstanding issue. What is Cathodic? 6 MR. BELLA: It's corrosion. The electrons 7 8 are moving from the metal to the water. Cathodic 9 protection forces those electrons back into the thing. That's how rust works. So it's an 10 11 important issue. However, recently, we've been 12 identifying some places where it actually can be a problem. And so that's what that is referring to. 13 14 PRESIDENT VANNOY: You'll have a quiz on 15 that, Tom. 16 I'm sorry, Commissioner Kolodziej, first. 17 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: I just, I 18 actually enjoy reading those reports. It takes me 19 a separate night just to go through. 20 COMMISSIONER DeVITA: Did you pick up 21 Cathodic? 22 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: No, no, and I'm 23 an English teacher so I should. 24 Page three where it deals with Pulaski 2.5 Park section of Passaic. They have gotten State

funding for this and, you know, we're eliminating. 1 2 Are they going to reimburse us in any way for our expense? It's a State grant. Why would we not? 3 Is it going to have any cost to us? Shouldn't we 5 be reimbursed for that under the State grant? 6 MR. BELLA: Generally, our rule is if, I 7 mean, generally, in the owner cities particular, 8 if we have to move something, a right-of-way, it's 9 generally, we have to move it. COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: Right. I have no 10 11 problem with that. However, I think this project, 12 Pulaski Park, they have just gotten funding from the State for this. So it's not coming out of the 13 14 owners cities' budget; it's coming out of the 15 State budget. I'm thinking to myself, it's a 16 wonderful policy. I have no problem with it. But 17 if there's an opportunity for us to get because 18 that's something we can put back into the City of 19 Passaic someplace else. 20 MR. BELLA: Sure. We'll talk to them 21 about it. 22 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: I think you 23 should look at that. 24 On page seven, this is the first time I've 25 seen us in a joint project with United Water.

Their favorite partner is North District Water

Is this something we should be discussing in closed session because of potential for litigation? I mean, I know it has to be done. I don't have a problem with it. You know, meeting after meeting after meeting is something else. I know where we stand status wise. I know this is a matter of possible litigation so this is something, Mr. Hanley, that

I shouldn't be doing, discussing it in closed 1 2 session? While he's reading that my last one, and 3 you mentioned it, Van Houten Avenue and Clifton 4 5 Avenue, that little shed there. I can't tell you how many people who live in Clifton say, oh, my 6 God, how wonderful it looks. Please go back and 7 tell the Commission that they did a good job, 8 9 however, they left this crummy door. MR. BELLA: We have the door. We just 10 11 haven't put it in. 12 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: Okay. Good. I can report back when it's done. 13 14 I can't tell you, I didn't realize how 15 many people noticed the eyesore. They said, 16 please go back and tell everybody what a great 17 job; can they do something about the door. I can 18 tell them yes, they are. Got it. Thank you. MR. AMODIO: Commissioner Bazian. 19 20 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Thank you, Mr. 21 President. Your voice has changed, by the way. 22 July was the hottest month, I think, by 23 record. How are we doing -- or pretty close to 24 it. How are we doing supply wise in terms of 25 river?

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MR. BELLA: Everything is fine now.

Unfortunately, not unfortunately, we've had plenty of rain now. Things are moving back up.

Reservoir levels have stabilized. You know, even at the end of July, it wasn't a critical situation where the water was in danger, getting into dangerous. We had antecedent conditions of reservoirs were such that we came out of one of the wettest winters we ever had in record. things, one is actual reservoirs were spilling on the end of the summer and ground-water levels were at record high. That all flows. That additional water will flow into the reservoir and streams. The streams flows are getting a little low, but we didn't have that much. When it started to get a little bit more difficult to treat, one little rain will make a big difference. It's amazing when you have a dry spell like that, particularly, in the summer, not one little rain, but one rain, decent rain where you have an inch and a half, that changes the whole biological activity of the river. In the summertime, dealing with a biological activity is a real treatment.

COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Thank you.

MR. BELLA: And our costs came down

1	substantially, by the way. Our chemical costs for
2	that one rain came down.
3	COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Really.
4	MR. BELLA: Yeah, it could be substantial.
5	PRESIDENT VANNOY: Anything else?
6	MR. AMODIO: Hearing none, onto the
7	Controller's Report.
8	MR. WEISS: Cash on hand is 12.9 million.
9	Accounts receivable are at 14.9 million.
10	Thirty days or less accounts receivable are at
11	14.6 million which is 98 percent.
12	Our accounts payable is at 5.2 million.
13	We are in the process of pulling together
14	our budget for 2013. We've got numbers back from
15	almost all the department heads so far and we
16	expect to have a budget to present at the next
17	upcoming finance committee meeting.
18	That's all I have.
19	COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Just
20	PRESIDENT VANNOY: I'll let you go first
21	this time.
22	COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Thank you.
23	Really a question for Joe. I forgot to
24	ask this one.
25	On the Top 20 Largest Amounts Delinquent,

I still don't see days outstanding. 1 2 MR. BELLA: You know, I agree with you and I --3 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: This is three times. MR. BELLA: I sent an e-mail over that. 5 6 You're right. 7 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: This is three times. 8 Thank you. 9 MR. BELLA: I told them. I told them. COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: I'm on the same 10 11 page on the delinquents and the shut-off notes. 12 I'm a big component of policy because that assures me that everybody is treated equal. 13 14 On the shut-off notice report, there is a 15 caveat which I've never seen before, that says 16 that you guys were told not to shut it off. I 17 thought if we have a policy. We are the ones that 18 determine that. How could an owner city usurp by 19 policy our decision? I think if the owner city 20 has, you know, a concern about that, then they 21 would have come to the full Commission as far as 22 that's concerned. 23 So I mean, again, I'm not looking for any 24 answers today. It's the first time I've ever seen 2.5 anything like that.

1 But, again, if we have an existing and we 2 have been talking about upgrading the shut-off policy, the notice. But we have something in 3 existence and I don't care if this was the City of 5 Clifton that requested that, to me, there's a 6 policy. There's a procedure. So somebody just research that for the next meeting so that... 7 8 You know, I'm not looking to make a 9 political brouhaha, but I just want to be sure 10 we're all treated equally and why an owner city 11 can basically say to us, no, you can't shut that 12 off, other than the hospital, which we know we 13 can't do because by law they're protected. But 14 that's okay. But these were different. So maybe 15 there's extenuating circumstances. 16 MR. BELLA: I have to look at the 17 specific. 18 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: That we don't 19 know. 20 Again, if we're working with the owner 21 city to get to where we need to go, that's fine. 22 But I think that the seven of us need to --23 MR. BELLA: I'll have Jim --24 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: I'm curious about 25 that, too. I didn't pick up the last part of that

shut-off part. So I'm curious about that. 1 2 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: It's the first time I seen it. 3 COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: I don't know what 5 that is. 6 MR. AMODIO: Any further questions? 7 Hearing none. Do I have a motion for closed session? 8 9 COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: So moved. COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: Second. 10 MR. 8	believe that was sent out together.
9	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: I didn't get it.
10	I'm sorry.
11	MR. AMODIO: Moving on.
12	Does the Chair accept, receive, and file
13	Miscellaneous Purchase Orders from Linda
14	Beckering, Purchasing Agent, from the period of
15	July 9th, 2012 to August 25th, 2012?
16	PRESIDENT VANNOY: Yes.
17	MR. AMODIO: Thank you.
18	Next, we have Contract #12-B-29 "Removal
19	and Disposal of Filter Sand and Carbon Mixture."
20	The recommendation to award a one year contract to
21	Allstate Power Vac, Incorporated of Rahway, New
22	Jersey, in the amount of \$48,000.

24	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: Question.
25	I'm a little confused. I read it all. We

1	have three bids on this. Obviously, we went with
2	the lowest bid. There was a tremendous,
3	tremendous difference in the bids. I mean, were
4	they all the same or are we talking about apples
5	and oranges?
6	MR. DUPREY: Well, there's several
7	criteria that would vary that. One being the
8	location of the facility and also their ability to
9	bring it to a disposal site.
10	Some of them may already have agreements
11	in place with disposal facilities, some of them
12	may not. So it's a lot of aspects out of our
13	control. So by doing the public bid, you know, we
14	just want with the best.
15	PRESIDENT VANNOY: But they're all apples
16	to apples, though, right?
17	MR. DUPREY: Yeah.
18	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: It's in our best
19	interest?
20	MR. DUPREY: Yes.
21	PRESIDENT VANNOY: Okay.
22	MR. AMODIO: Any further questions?
23	Hearing none, do I have a motion?
24	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: So moved.
25	MR. AMODIO: Motion by Commissioner

1	Kolodziej.
2	Do I have a second?
3	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: Second.
4	MR. AMODIO: By Commissioner DeVita.
5	On the roll.
6	
7	(Roll call was taken, all Commissioners
8	present respond in the affirmative. Commissioners
9	Rodriguez, Sanchez, and Levine are absent)
10	
11	MR. AMODIO: Motion approved.
12	Next, we have a Resolution Authorizing
13	Passaic Valley Water Commission's participation in
14	a Water Research Foundation (WRF) Project 4451
15	"Utility Risk Management Methodologies for Buried
16	Assets with Improved Triple Bottom Line
17	Understanding of Pipe Failure" with a total
18	in-kind service contribution equivalent to the
19	value of \$25,000. PVWC also agrees to make an
20	additional monetary distribution of \$20,000.
21	Questions?
22	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: Question.
23	Is our agreement with the Stratus
24	Consulting Research?
25	MR. BELLA: What I'd like to do is take

1	out the monetary contribution thing until we have
2	a chance to do that. But we really should
3	participate in that. George seems to think we
4	have to make a separate agreement with them.
5	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: It's just going to
6	be in-kind then?
7	MR. HANLEY: They are a private entity.
8	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: That's my question.
9	What is Stratus Consulting? It's like a
10	combination.
11	MR. BELLA: They're working for the
12	research foundation as an investigator of their
13	COMMISSIONER DeVITA: So is our agreement
14	with Stratus Consulting?
15	MR. BELLA: No, it's with the research
16	foundation, I believe.
17	MR. HANLEY: Well, that's not the way I
18	read it.
19	MR. BELLA: That's why we're cutting it
20	out, until we get a chance to
21	COMMISSIONER BAZIAN: May I suggest that
22	if we're not sure what this is, perhaps we don't
23	vote and get it right.
24	COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: Right.
25	MR. AMODIO: Motion to hold.

1	PRESIDENT VANNOY: Very good.
2	MR. AMODIO: Carry to the next meeting.
3	Next, we have Summary of Disbursements and
4	Payrolls through August 14th, 2012 in the amount
5	of \$8,076,990.33.
6	Treasurer Levine is not here. Would

4	MR. AMODIO: Thank you.

7	PRESIDENT VANNOY: I would like to thank
8	the Commission for being very sensitive in showing
9	their love for Commissioner Rodriguez's brother
10	who passed away and I'd like to thank you.
11	MR. AMODIO: Okay. Nothing else.
