3	Commission meeting is called to order at 9:36.

12	Commissioners Depadua and Van Rensalier are

20	PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: No comments from the
21	public? I guess we have none.
22	Moving on. Report of finance. I guess
23	Carmen is not here now.
24	COMMISSIONER COTTON: Is she coming?
25	PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: I don't know.

1	COMMISSIONER COTTON: Anybody heard
2	anything?
3	MR. MUELLER: She was planning on being
4	here.
5	PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Yitz, do you want to
6	report on what we discussed on the finance
7	committee, please? You were there.
8	MR. WEISS: Finance, we reviewed the cash
9	disbursements.
10	We had a little bit of an extensive
11	discussion about overtime and tracking overtime.
12	I don't know if there was anything else
13	specific.
14	MR. MUELLER: A couple of the Engineering
15	and Lab we talked about in terms of staffing up
16	there and getting people in place.
17	Robert's on. We're also going to talk
18	about the audit.
19	MR. WEISS: Yes, we reviewed the draft
20	audit and we're getting a copy of the final audit.
21	We actually are getting a copy of our final audit
22	and we have our auditor with us to be able to
23	discuss it.
24	PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Thank you.
25	Personnel, would you please help out, Joe?

Personnel met last week. We reviewed all the items that also appear on this morning's agenda. Unanimously recommended moving forward with them.

We briefly discussed some of the greater current needs in terms of staffing, which is Customer Service, the Lab, Water Treatment, and IT.

We also briefly discussed the current contract negotiations. I believe that's going to be in closed session for this morning.

We also talked about the salary compensation needs and the need to fix it so that we can attract good employees and more importantly, retain good employees.

Then we also discussed at the end of the committee meeting some new requirements from pensions, who's been kicking people out or reducing their retirement pay. So we discussed the new standard operating procedure that includes a resolution and I believe that will be further discussed later on this morning as well.

That was personnel.

PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Special projects,

please.

COMMISSIONER COTTON: Thank you, President Sanchez.

We had our special projects meeting on Friday. We had about ten items and I could just go through them real quickly.

One of them is the Shared Services Agreement with the City of Lodi for hydrant testing. So that's the one.

Also, what we did was, on the second one we extended a contract for the testing of the fire hydrants from the City of North Arlington and Lodi.

The next item we discussed in special projects is the extension of the contract to remove the hauling of liquid residues. Sometimes I say you don't understand, it is a lot. It's like 36 million gallons that has to be taken away.

The next item that we have for special projects is the purchase that we were called in earlier in August, I believe, they need to replace ten vans. Right now we're getting five of them and they're cargo vans, which we were all aware of during the summer and this is coming out of our capital money.

1 The next item is for I think it's 2 distribution. They need to purchase two Bobcats. 3 The one they have now is 2005. It's old. 4 needs to be replaced. We all agreed that needs to 5 be replaced. 6 The next one is the Shared Services 7 Agreement with, I'm not quite sure... Oh, the 8 Shared Services Agreement. What they do is they 9 collect data and information from the Passaic 10 River at Little Falls, they collect it. So we 11 agreed to extend it. 12 MR. MUELLER: This is USGS. There's two. 13 COMMISSIONER COTTON: There's two of them. 14 All right. 15 We also recommended too in special 16 projects appointment for compliance officers. 17 need permit compliance officers for Passaic Valley 18 Water to file reports with the State, so we agreed 19 to that. 20 Also, we have contracts, different 21 professional service contracts and they're in the 22 table. They should have been in your... The only 23 thing is we were going to do only two. 24 MR. MUELLER: Only two.

COMMISSIONER COTTON: We're only going to

1	do two contracts. We had six of them but we
2	decided we're going to do two. Patrick, our
3	engineer and our director Jim needs to go back and
4	discuss some of the rest of the other ones on
5	here.
6	Also, we're going to recommend awarding a
7	contract for services for purchasing for the
8	software that's needed.
9	We also talked about the Great Falls
10	Pedestrian Bridge, the Levine tanks, and the FEMA
11	recovery. The Great Falls Bridge and the tanks
12	and the FEMA is not on the agenda. We can discuss
13	it later. But the rest of the items the special
14	projects committee agreed that we move forward
15	with everything that's on there.
16	Thank you.
17	PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Just for the record,
18	Commissioner Carmen Depadua is here.
19	COMMISSIONER DEPADUA: Good morning.
20	PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Jim, go ahead. Would
21	you report, please.
22	MR. MUELLER: Sure.
23	So I circulated the report on Monday.
24	It's in the package as well.
25	Operational Issues. We continued to focus

on the treatment plant and the Fiber Optic

Topology, which is being reconfigured to eliminate single points of failure. We did a plant shutdown last week, upgraded four 20-year old switches with new more capable SCADA switches. We're going to keep rotating through that at the plant to upgrade our systems.

Siemens, our contractor, has started second round of inspection testing and calibration of electrical systems at the Little Falls site and the work is being performed under renewal of their original contract.

As I think all of you know, on
August 26th, starting on August 26th, we received
extensive discolored water complaints in four
zones in Clifton, Zones 1 through 4. We started
re-flushing those zones on September 2nd, 24 hours
a day/7 days a week. We suspect and we actually
proved out, we flew a drone up in that area and
found contractors accessing local hydrants which
is extensive construction going in that area.
We've been working very closely with Nick Villano,
the city manager, and went on September 20th to
the City Council and the mayor, presented them
what the issues were. That's also attached to the

report. I won't go through it now. But, again,

it was short term.

Our plans are we've re-flushed the system.

Complaints are drastically down. Water's being reported as not discolored anymore.

Short term we're looking at a permitting process so we understand where contractors are going to be. They have to come to us and let us know. They might fill at our yard or maybe fill at a DPW yard rather than in the street.

Longer term we're looking at pipe replacement and lining, which is capital intensive. As I reported to the council, it's probably a better part of ten years or more that that would be phased over time and try to address problem areas first. There's extensive online cast irons needs in that area. They're also in Paterson. They're also in Passaic.

So this presentation that I attached, our plan is to go to Paterson and Passaic as the owner cities and then Prospect Park, North Arlington and Lodi, part of our retail system, give the same presentations. We have to make sure when there's extensive construction, paving, street sweeping, even dust control for longer construction, they

need water, it's water intensive that they have to make sure they're not accessing hydrants without our approval and in locations that they shouldn't be accessing because of the mains underneath.

So that's just a quick report out there.

The issue in Clifton, we did water distribution for six days as we were trying to figure that out. The issue was resolved. But, again, it's something we want to sit with each of the owner cities with the mayors and their key staff to get that word out. So that's on Clifton.

Organizational Highlights. Two new hires started. Brandon Fuld as Director of EH&S on September 6th and also Landy Ducheine also on September 6th, Director of Information Technology. So the board approved those positions in July and they started September 6th.

The search process is still ongoing for Director of Communications.

As Commissioner Kolodziej mentioned at the personnel committee meeting, it came up in finance as well in terms of OT. We're looking at organization wide in terms of what the needs are. Key focuses are Engineering, Lab, Customer Service, which a lot of positions are on the

agenda for today were former transfers out of

Customer Service - we have to backfill them 
Information Technology and Distribution. You'll

hear more about those groups and specific

positions at future meetings. We'll work through

that with the personnel committee.

Regulatory Issues. EPA's Health Advisories. As you all know, we've been issuing alerts every three months because we're not in compliance with PFOS goals or the targets there. So the folks have not been able to drink that water. We've gotten a temporary system online as of August 16th we are now treating and it's in compliance with the PFOS regulations in terms of the metrics, in terms of the parameters. We do still need to build a permanent system by regulation. At least a temporary system is in service and we're planning on having an open house for the community to come down and see the system, getting the word out to them that it's now in place. It's really good news and we were mandated by the end of the year to have the temporary system in place, we beat that by four months, which is great.

Little Falls Treatment Plant. Again, PFOS

I reported on it at our last meeting in July. EPA came out with health advisories for eight different kinds of "forever chemicals". They're basically non-detect or below the detection limits that they want us to go down to. We do not currently meet that level, so they're not mandated yet but it's like an advisory. Next step is likely in the next few years to come up with extra targets.

We are starting a pilot program to figure out what we need to do at Little Falls in terms of meeting those future targets. So myself, Wendy, Engineering -- I'm sorry -- Purification, Engineering, you know, Pat and Wendy will be part of that. We're also going to engage a consultant as well as peer review through organizations, AWWA and others, to come and look at what we're doing. We have a nice pilot set up at Little Falls, so that's coming up ahead.

Delinquent Accounts. As you all know, the shutoff moratorium was lifted on March 15th. We had planned to start shutoffs through the messaging, to start shutoffs August 22nd is when they actually started. We did it for about ten days. We received about \$132,000 from those

shutoffs in that ten-day period, which is great. Unfortunately, the issue in Clifton, we had to pivot resources out of shutoffs and into 24/7 flushing of those four zones in Clifton. So we will pick back up on those shutoffs in the next week or so as we're figuring out resources.

We also pivoted resources once we address the issue in Zone 1 through 4 into the routine flushing to try to finish that quicker because we fell behind because of what we had to do with the re-flushing. So we will back to the shutoffs. It was effective. We got \$132,000 across either payment plans or lump sum payment in those ten days, so we will revisit that.

Program. We've gotten \$22,000 in payments from the State. I think it was 38 accounts, so that was great. We're, again, still trying to get the word out. The State has the process to determine the eligibility. We don't have anything to do with it. People have to apply. They have to be determined to be eligible. So, again, we keep getting the word out, but it is moving.

COMMISSIONER COTTON: Let me just ask if I

1 MR. MUELLER: Please. 2 COMMISSIONER COTTON: That mean they got 3 to call down to the DCA if they need to have assistance? 5 MR. MUELLER: Yeah, correct. And they have 6 to apply online. There's a website or you could 7 do a hard copy, but they have to submit an application as well. 9 PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Is that for residential customers or? 10 11 MR. MUELLER: Just residential. 12 COMMISSIONER COTTON: I'm going to try to 13 get the word out. 14 MR. MUELLER: I mean, you were great at 15 the press conference, Commissioner. I just want 16 to thank Commissioner Kolodziej, Commissioner 17 Depadua, and you, Commissioner Cotton, for coming 18 and getting that word out and it's just continual 19 trying to get it out there. 20 I know the State, I'm not sure if they're 21 going to renew it for next year, so, again, we're 22 trying to get everybody in for this year and use 23 whatever money other people aren't using. 24 So, yeah, just keep on getting the word 25 out. That will be helpful.

1 Communications. So I mentioned the press 2 conference on August 30th. We had that press conference on LIHWAP. Again, try to get the word 3 out. It was great attendance. We had Senator 5 Nellie Pou; Assemblyman Gary Schaer; Assemblyman 6 Benjie Wimberly; Paterson Mayor Andre Sayegh; 7 Prospect Park Council President Shah; and 8 Commissioners Cotton, Kolodziej, Depadua. So that 9 was terrific. 10 We continue to communicate with the 11 communities on the moratorium. If you remember 12 the shutoffs, we started with businesses because 13 we were letting LIHWAP try to take hold and get 14 the word out for residents, so we're not jumping 15 in the residents yet, but in the next few months 16 it's clear where our application rate is. 17 COMMISSIONER COTTON: We haven't started 18 residential yet? 19 MR. MUELLER: No, that's what I'm saying, 20 Just commercial, just commercial. 21 That's it for my... Next month I will 22 report out on our Lead Service Line Replacement 23 Program. We are making progress. 24 PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Jim, I'd like to, 25 while I got you here now, I got you on the full

board. I notice a lot of people, big people retiring from Distribution, the Lab. I just feel that all the energy should be put into hiring to get the departments to run normal again.

You have Jeff Baig leaving and I think he's not going to be here in December. I think he used all his time. So I think by the end of November he'll be out. That's plus he's taking some of his licenses that he has.

So my thinking is, Mr. Kolodziej, since you're on the personnel committee, how do we have -- even if we need outside resources to hire people for those departments, I'd like to spend a lot more energy trying to get people in those departments because God knows what will happen if we don't get to a level normalcy and I hear a lot of more people are planning on leaving.

I need for you to come up with a plan in two weeks how we're going to do this. Even if we need to go outside and get help to hire these people. We need people there and we need them ASAP.

So I'd like the board to help me help you do whatever it takes to get that done because we need it and it's really necessary that we just get

on it and get done with it.

COMMISSIONER COTTON: I think that, if I may, I didn't know these people are going out. We don't get no who's leaving and what their title is and who we really need to replace. I think that needs to be shared with everybody. I hear it, because you're making it sound, and it probably is --

PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: It is, Commissioner, it's bad.

COMMISSIONER COTTON: We're going to be in trouble. But, I mean, we can't fix what happened in the past. I always said that, you know, people here now really wants to go to school and get their license. Back in the past it was stopped, they wouldn't sign off in order to get your license. Someone in the plant has to sign off. So now I think we need to encourage more of our employees to want to do that if they working in the treatment plant to do that. I'm not quite sure what we're looking at. How many people we're looking at leaving, I'm not sure. I think that needs to be shared with all of us.

PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Yeah, and in the process, I agree with Commissioner Ruby, we need

to make sure that if we have people that within five, seven years, they be on that path, we got assure them: Listen, you have a great path here. You know what I'm saying. This is what it takes. What do you need from us. Do it. We need to do that because I feel like some of the guys are older, they're leaving, they're getting sick.

So, listen, Jim, God bless you. I know you have a lot on your plate and some of the things I respect you need to deal with. This, this you got to get your whole department to do this, if not we're going to be in trouble, trust me. And it's falling all on you because for the past we're not getting all the information and now we're getting it. We know what's going on. So, please, let's get it going.

Mr. Kolodziej, I don't know if there's anything you could do to help through the personnel committee.

COMMISSIONER KOLODZIEJ: No. That was part of the discussion that we had and some of the departments that were in greatest need at the personnel committee meeting and Administration's certainly on top of it. Our new hire, Mr. Garcia, in HR is also on top of it.

It would be nice to see, like you said, in two weeks, here's our plan of where we're going; here's where we're going to need help. It sounds to me like you're going to have unanimous support from the board if we have to go outside to spend the money, we'll go outside to spend the money.

PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Listen, we do whatever

COMMISSIONER LEVINE: Who's next in line

MR. BRISMAN: Let's not talk about

COMMISSIONER DEPADUA: I have a question. Do you go through applications? Somebody maybe applied for that position a year ago. So how do you know like who applied or who's looking for the job or you just post and that's how you bring the people in, whoever applies or do you go through these applications that have been put on file?

PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: I don't know the process and I don't know if we have candidates for those types of positions, which I doubt.

People apply, just because they apply for a certain position and we weren't looking for at the

time, what happened to that application? get put away? Does it get thrown out? MR. MUELLER: There was applications submitted. I'm not going to mention names, but yesterday I found out that one of our key staff is planning to retire, as President Sanchez said. So I will have a plan in place in a couple of weeks. I already got a contact and starting to 

talk how we get through that in short term while
we staff up.

There are a couple of key positions also
vacant and have been vacant for quite some time
under that key position that's leaving. So

there's three key vacancies there. We have been trying to fill the under vacancies for the last

five months and it has not been successful.

So we have to come back on and I'll have that plan in two weeks. But I know the positions; I know what we'll need. I think some of the lower levels we might be in better shape or we can move people up because they've been here and have the experience, but not at these assistant or higher level than that.

So I'll be back in two weeks with a plan.

I think that's completely fair and was my intent. 1 PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: I appreciate that, but 2 3 I think you're going to have a unanimous support from the board. Whatever it takes, we need to do 5 this. It could be bad. 6 MR. MUELLER: I appreciate your support. 7 COMMISSIONER COTTON: When can we share 8 names? 9 MR. MUELLER: We haven't Riced. 10 haven't had this plan. 11 PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: It hasn't been Riced. 12 If you want, after the meeting you can... 13 COMMISSIONER DEPADUA: I can understand 14 what you're saying because I feel, if I'm on the 15 same page here, the moment we know somebody's 16 retiring we can bring somebody in before that 17 person leaves so this way we need to get them 18 trained and know the department and get to know, 19 you know, the process and how it works. So it's 20 always good to not wait until that person leaves 21 and then all of a sudden you're trying to get 22 somebody thrown in there. 23 PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: It's a tough market of 24 labor. We have to make an effort to get people in 25 and we're going to do it. It could be done.

1 from the thinking that anything could be done. A 2 lot more work, but we're going to get it done and this is what I want to do. 3 MR. MUELLER: Thank you for the support. 4 5 PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Mr. Comptroller, tell 6 us you got money, please. 7 MR. WEISS: We got money. Cash on hand is 13.8 million. 8 9 Our accounts receivable's at 21.6 million. 10 Our accounts payable's at 5.5 million. 11 We have Rob McNinch, who is the managing 12 auditor on our audit to discuss the results of our 13 audit. He's on Zoom because he wasn't feeling 14 well and he didn't want to get everybody sick, so 15 I told him we appreciate him not getting everybody 16 sick. 17 PRESIDENT SANCHEZ: Thank you, Robert. 18 MR. McNINCH: Thank you guys. Thank you 19 for having me here remote. 20 So as Yitz mentioned, we did wrap up our 21 audit, the 2021 financial statements. I'd just 22 like to take a quick few moments just to highlight 23 some areas in the report and give a few financial 24 highlights for the 2021 year. 25 So financially speaking, 2021 was a good
